Operation Round Up Teacher Mini-Grants

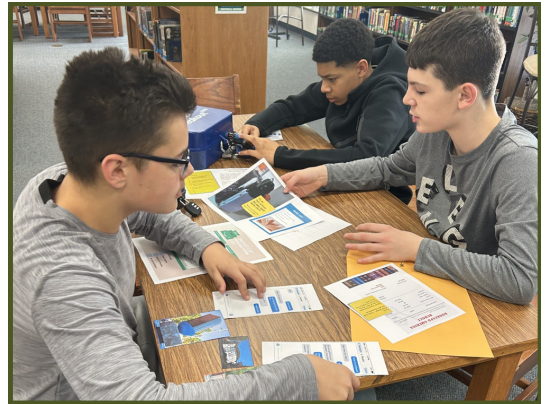

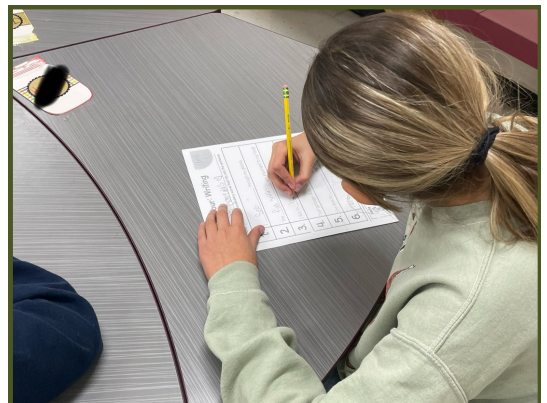
Karla Alvarez, a teacher at Frenship High School, used her grant to purchase painting supplies for her students to create a mural.
